<u>Captain Paul Labine</u> <u>Cochenour 1970</u> <u>Miss McKenzie 1988</u>

Paul Labine was born on July 9th, 1970 at Margaret Cochenour Memorial Hospital, back before the hospital moved to its current location in Red Lake. His parents were Don and Mary Anne Labine who were living in their little house at 56 Elliot Street in Cochenour at the time.

In 1972, the Labine family moved away for their father's mechanical engineering career, first to Thunder Bay and then to Calgary, Ottawa and Vancouver, but almost always came back to Cochenour and Red Lake for summer vacations.
